Glass City Tour

In 1888, Edward Drummond Libbey, son to the owner of New England Glass, moved the company to Toledo, Ohio. He renamed the company to Libbey, thus creating a glass dynasty that still exists here today. Visit some of Toledo's most iconic places and learn how Toledo came to be known as the "Glass City".

Toledo Museum of Art, 2445, Monroe St., Toledo

One of America's finest museums with over 30,000 works of art in over 35 galleries. Edward Drummond Libbey was the founder of the Toledo Museum of Art in 1901, serving as its president from 1901 to 1925, funding building construction, and bequeathing to the museum his collection of Dutch and English art.

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Old West End Tour/Libbey House Driving Tour, 2008 Scottwood Ave., Toledo

This neighborhood is one of the best kept secrets in the country with Twenty-five city blocks making up one of the largest collections of late Victorian houses left standing in the United States. Be sure to check out the Libbey home, built for Edward and Florence Libbey in 1895, on Scottwood Avenue. Other streets not to miss include Parkwood Ave., Robinwood Ave., Glenwood Ave. and Collingwood Blvd.
